Civil Unrest in France



Unrest has spread throughout France after police shot 17-year old Nahel M in Nanterre. The teen was shot at point-blank range as he drove off during a traffic check, and crashed soon afterwards. Paris police claimed they had contained "Sporadic episodes" of fresh violence. This has sparked immense civil unrest across France over the death of the teen. In Toulouse, Southern France, fires were started by protesters and firefighters had stones thrown at them as they attempted to put them out, and in Lille, demonstrators have also clashed with the police. In the Western town of Rennes, around 300 people gathered to pay tribute to the teen, many of whom started fires and were dispersed by the police to allow firefighters to deal with the flames, local media reported. French president Emmanuel Macron has stated that the shooting of Nahel was "Unforgivable", however, his comments have been criticised by police unions, who have accused him of rushing to judge the officers involved. The Alliance Police union have called for the officers to be presumed innocent until found guilty, however, the riva Unité SGP Police also spoke of political interventions that spoke of and encouraged "anti-cop hatred".

The officer who has been accused of killing him, who has said he fired because he felt his life was in danger, is currently in custody with charges of voluntary manslaughter. Nahel, who a neighbor says is from a French-Algerian family, is the second person in France to be shot at a traffic stop this year by police. Last year, a record 13 people were killed this way. Rights groups have criticised a 2017 law that broadened the framework for when officers can use firearms.

Amid fears of violence a gun shop in Marseille in southern France was looted by 30 people and 4 hunting rifles were stolen. The incident occured during a fourth night of violence in France.

EU Approves Draft Law To Regulate Al



Recently, people have been thinking about AI (Artificial Intelligence) as a potential risk to what we currently class as a 'normal' society. While it is good to see world leaders considering the potential problems of AI along with all of its benefits, we should remember that not all risks are equal. On the 14th of June, the European Parliament voted to approve a draft of a new law, known as the 'AI Act'. After the final stages of negotiation, it will most likely be approved by the end of the year. If passed, it will be the first law in the world regulating AI use in most sectors of society.

This law is purely based on risk; it is not the AI itself that is being regulated, but instead, the way that it is used in parts of society, each of which carries its own set of potential problems. They have been divided into 4 categories of risk: unacceptable, high, limited and minimal. Systems posing a risk to human rights or EU values will be classed as 'unacceptable' and will be prohibited. 1 risk like this is 'predictive policing'. Another risk in this category is the use of face recognition technology on live street feeds. The systems classed as 'high risk' will be subject to the obligations of disclosure and will be added to a special database. Some examples could include AI that can control services in education, employment, financing and healthcare. Limited risk will need limited transparency requirements and will require things like disclosing that users are talking with a machine, not another user. After 2 to 3 years it will apply to any business inside of the EU.







Rwanda plan deemed 'unlawful'



The Government's £140 million plan to deport asylum seekers (people in search of refuge, usually fleeing from conflict) who have arrived in the UK to the Central African Country of Rwanda, has been deemed 'unlawful' by the Court of Appeal. The Court of Appeal was created in 1875 and concluded last week that the plan was 'unlawful' due to Rwanda being unsafe. The UK's Prime Minister, Rishi Sunak, said he believed the Rwandan Government's assurances that there would be no danger or risks, adding: "While I respect the court I fundamentally disagree with their conclusions." Alongside this, the UK's Home Secretary (the Minister who is responsible for making all areas like borders secure and safe), Suella Braverman said she 'respectfully disagrees' with the Court's ruling, also stating "its not over yet", with the Government claiming to appeal the Court's decision to the Supreme Court, the final court of appeal which judges cases of National significance, generally involving the whole population. The Rwanda plan was part of the Government's scheme to 'stop the boats' and prevent illegal immigration into the UK.

However, the Home Office also revealed it could cost around £63,000 more to welcome a migrant into the UK than to deport them to Rwanda at an overall average cost of £169,000 per person in its official economic assessment of the Illegal Immigration Bill passed in March 2023 by Suella Braverman.

Last week, on Question Time, the BBC's discussion programme where members of the public are questioned about current affairs, the audience were asked to raise their hand if they supported the Government's new plan; not a single person showed their support and put their hand up in a blow against the Government.

Welsh coal mine digging 'unlawful'

Alongside this, Welsh lawyers said last week that the continued coal mining of Ffos-y-Fran Merthyr mine is also 'unlawful'. The mine has ran out of planning permission and can no longer be mined according to an enforcement notice issued recently.

Race car drivers blink in the same places

On average, humans blink between 14,400 and 19,200 times a day but a new study shows that race car drivers blink in different places around race tracks that are safer to do so. When people blink, the World goes dark for around 1 fifth of a second but due to race drivers going at a top speed of 354 km/h (220 mph), this can be potentially dangerous with drivers passing almost 20 metres in just a fifth of a second. In addition to this, people can blink up to 30 times a minute or once every 2 seconds, ultimately meaning that a race car driver could be practically blinded for 600m every minute. According to one neurologist, "a slight mistake could lead to life-threatening danger." This provoked Ryota Nishizono to study when racing drivers blink. Nishizono, a Japanese racing team and a group of researchers tested when people blinked around a race track. Over the course of 304 laps on 3 different racetracks, the scientists concluded that the drivers usually blinked on straight parts of the tracks and kept their eyes open on more dangerous sections of the tracks where they are required to change speed and direction like a curve. Scientists are partially baffled by the new study as they had always that people blink relatively randomly although blinking in sports hasn't been covered by researchers that much in the past.

All about: Lab-grown meat

What is lab-grown meat and how is it made?

Lab-grown meat is biotechnological meat that has been engineered and cultivated from a few individual cells. The cells are extracted from an animal and grown into muscle cells, eventually creating an almost perfect replica of meat over a long period of time.

Why lab-grown meat?

The vast majority of animal derived meat based products are sourced from huge commercial factories and farms which generally are not only unethical for the animal, but are also bad for the environment with 60% of food production based greenhouse gas emissions emitted because of meat. Animal agriculture is responsible for at least 16.5% of all greenhouse gases emitted currently. Lab grown meat can ensure the buyer that the product has not caused any harm to animals and is better for the environment as it requires less land and less food for the animals. In addition to this, it generally acts as a safer option in terms of bacterial side effects like e.coli being much rarer in lab grown products. If produced at a large scale, it could become much quicker and easier than to farm animals directly. However, recently some studies have shown that actually these lab grown substitutes are actually worse for the environment due to the huge requirement of energy to cultivate the cells. One company crafting lab grown shrimps found that they could grow 1 billion healthy shrimps out of just a few cells via reproduction.

Could this be a possible future alternative?

The first lab grown meat ever was made in 2013 and cost \$300,000 for just one burger. The price has now reduced greatly to \$1.36 in just 2 years. Sadly for many, lab grown meats are prohibited currently in all but two Countries but progress is being made into this sector at a rapid rate.

Around The World





Lab-grown meat has been approved for sale in the US, the second Country to do so after Singapore. The meat is grown in laboratories from animal cells, the building blocks of animal life. The US government has given permission to two companies, Upside Food and Good Meat, to sell the lab-grown meat to the public. Restaurants have already placed orders for the meat.



South Koreans have become younger due to a new age counting law. The law has scrapped one traditional korean system, which deemed South Koreans one year old at birth, counting time spent in the womb. Another counted everyone ageing on the first day of January instead of on their birthdays. President Yoon Suk Yoel claims that the traditional method created "Unnecessary social and



economic costs."

Former Brazilian President Jair Bolsonaro has been put on trial and has received an 8 year election ban. Bolsonaro has been accused of undermining Brazilian democracy by falsely claiming the electronic ballots were vulnerable to hacking and fraud. He has been found guilty of abusing his power and won't be able to stand in the next Presidential election in 2026.



The Wagner Group (a Russian Military organisation who has assisted in the invasion of Ukraine), has gained more influence in the West African Country of Mali. The outcome of Friday's UN security council vote has decided to terminate a peacekeeping operation in Mali. This was also influenced by the countries military regime, who are insisting that the 12,000 international troops must depart. Because of this, Mali will be more dependant on the Wagner Group for security back-up.



On 22nd June, 227 migrants were rescued by emergency services, including babies and children, from 4 boats off the coast of the Canary Islands in Spain. The Atlantic migration route from West Africa to mainland Spain, is very dangerous, and experts have estimated that almost 45 boats sank in 2022 while attempting it. A migrant is someone who has left their Country in search of a better life, work, and education.





Twitter Temporarily Restricts Tweets Users Can See

In the last few days, Twitter has put a temporary limit on the number of tweets users can see. In a tweet by Twitter's CEO, Elon Musk, he stated that new unverified accounts can read 500 tweets a day, unverified accounts can read 1k tweets a day and 'verified' accounts are currently limited to 10k tweets a day. So, what is the point of these restrictions?

Elon said that these temporary limits are to address "Extreme levels of data scraping and system manipulation." He said that it was happening so much, that it was "degrading" service for normal users. The move has been described as a 'temporary emergency measure.' It is not extremely clear what he means by 'data scraping', but it seems to be the scraping of large amounts of data used by AI to train chatbots, like ChatGPT. In more simple terms, data scraping means taking information from the internet and using it for things like training chatbots for a user's benefit. However, platforms like Twitter and Reddit want to be paid for having this data taken. As mentioned in a previous issue, Twitter has already started charging users for the APIs which is used for third-party apps, to help combat this. It's also possible Musk is looking at making people pay for Twitter Blue (a monthly subscription that gives a few benefits like a checkmark next to your name) to get full access to the platform. According to a website called Downdetector, a peak of 5,100 people reported problems using Twitter on Saturday.

So overall, these restrictions have been put in place to combat data scraping which is used to train AI, these restrictions could lead to some longer-term restrictions, but for now, they will only last a limited time.

The Ashes second test.

Starting on the 28th of July, day one took place with Australia pulling off an impressive score of 339 for 5, taking the early advantage. With things looking bright for The Aussies, weight was taken off their back going into day 2. Nathan Lyon (spin bowler) dropped out with a calf injury that gave England one less player to worry about. Australia kept their strong lead up until day 5.

England prayed for heroics from the batsmen.
